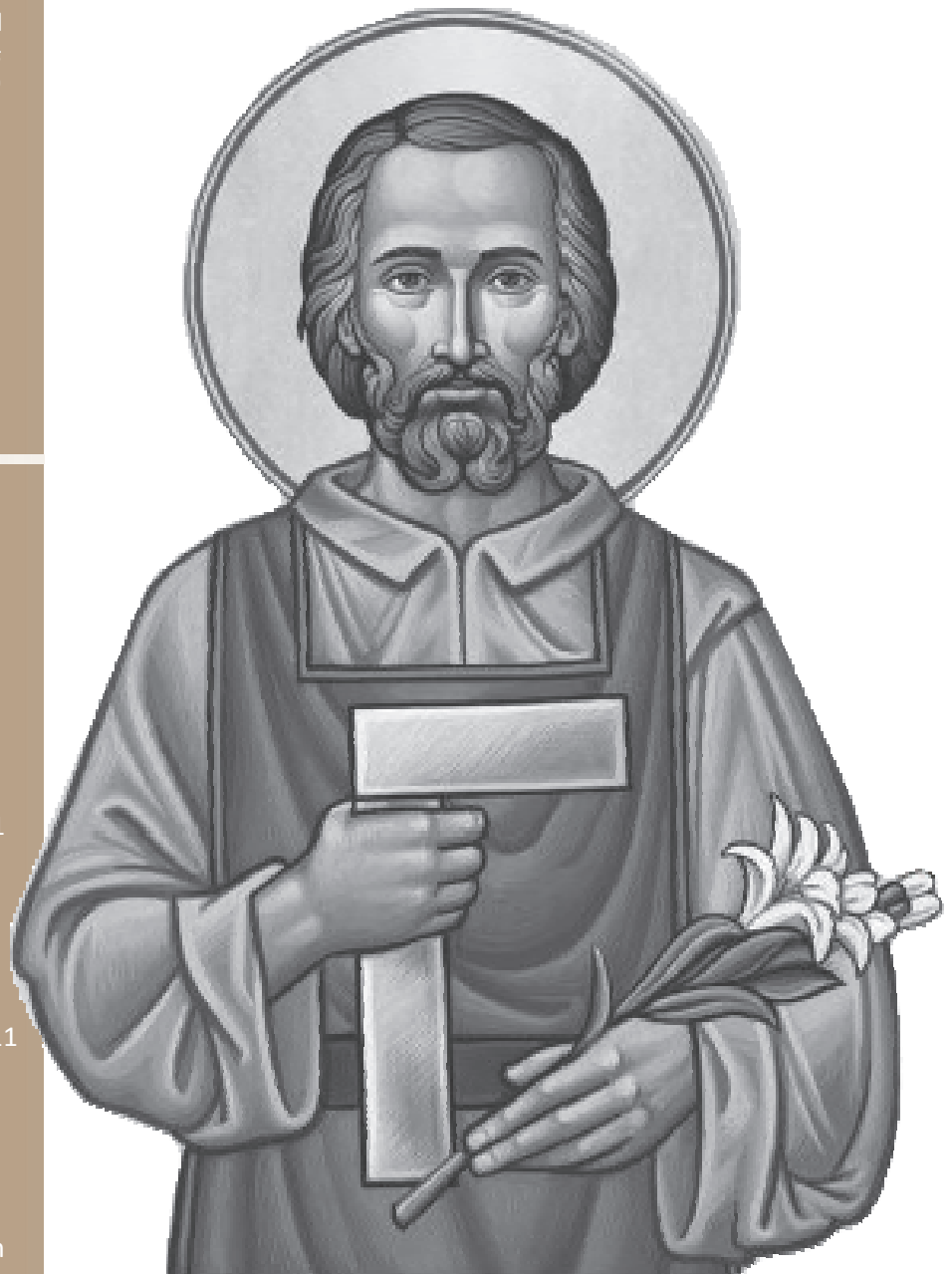

Behind the Scenes of This Week's Readings

Today's Gospel – John 2:1-11

The account of Jesus changing water into wine at the wedding in Cana, a small town north of Galilee, appears only in John's Gospel. It is the first in a series of episodes in the "Book of Signs" within the Gospel that John uses to show how Jesus is the long-awaited Messiah who is ushering in a new, messianic age, an age of peace and prosperity. The old is giving way to the new. This reference to a super abundance of wine was a figure of speech often used by the prophets (e.g., Amos and Joel) to describe how rich and abundant this new Messianic age would be.

This Week in Prayer

Trends in Mass Attendance – Pre-pandemic, roughly 1,100 people would come to our weekend Masses. In December's first three weekends, we averaged 750 people per weekend. That puts us at just about 70 percent "back to normal." On a typical Christmas, about 2,000 come to Mass here. This year, about 1,400 people came to Mass. Again, we are very close to 70 percent. We continue to move in good directions.

Trends in Livestreaming – Pre-pandemic, we had no livestreaming. The number of livestream participants peaked shortly after Easter of 2020. Our busiest weekend included about 25,000. We had our millionth view in August. The number of livestreaming congregants has decreased significantly. Our decline, however, has not been nearly as steep as the national trend. In the first three weekends of December, we averaged 1,400 live streamers per weekend. Over Christmas, about 1,900 prayed with us online.

Total Numbers – When we add both groups, we get an average of 2,150 people praying together on weekends (in-person and online). We had 3,300 praying together on Christmas (in person and online). The survey you so graciously completed will enable us to move even further toward knowing what God wants, wanting what God wants, and doing what God wants, in terms of enabling us to hear the word and receive the Eucharist. If you have any big thoughts on this front, please share them with me and our Parish Council.

Monsignor Fell – We are glad to welcome Monsignor John Fell to our community. Monsignor will continue to celebrate the Thursday morning Mass, as he has since the summer. Monsignor will also be the Sunday celebrant at either the 8:00, the 11:30, or, when it returns on March 6, the 6:00 pm. We will be working in chunks of several weeks. Since the Feast of Christ the King, Monsignor has been presiding at the 11:30. From January 16 through February 27, he will be celebrating the 8:00 am. It is a blessing to have Monsignor with us.

In-car Anointing – It was a spontaneous thing a week ago after the 11:30 but it should probably be "a thing." Let me know your thoughts about quarterly in-car anointing services. Lots of people

seemed to be glad about it. Whatever works is what we will do.

This Week in Community

The Christmas Trees – Please remove the decorations from your trees the week. We will start to remove the trees on Monday, January 24. Thanks for your beautiful work. The trees have supplied terrific inspiration.

The Church Roof – The Buildings and Grounds Committee (B&G) convinced me in September that we should not wait to replace the church roof. We have collected our three bids and have selected a roofer. The next step is to request permission from the diocese to engage the contractor. It will cost about \$100,000 and, thanks to your generosity, we can pay for it from our capital repair and improvements fund, line 559.

The Church HVAC – The Ida rains exposed some unexpected troubles with our HVAC system. B&G believes that the right move is to swap out the equipment that heats and cools the north end of the church. The good news is that the new system will cut the number of machines from six to one. The challenging news is that it will cost a little more than \$200,000. By the end of June – again, owing to your dedication to our parish – we should have enough in the 559 account to fund the project.

Prudent Driving – This announcement is a worthy repeat. God has blessed us with terrific neighbors. They support our efforts in countless ways. They ask very little in return. At the top of their short list is responsible driving. Regrettably, two very scary situations occurred recently. Please stay under 20 mph on Yorktown Road and look BOTH ways at the stop sign at the intersection of Yorktown and Colonial. Church will be here when you arrive. I promise. Thanks.

With continued thanks to all who worked so hard to make Christmas so good for so many. And with all best blessings for 2022, for all parishioners and loved ones of parishioners. Fr Hank

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

You are gifted, any way you slice it

We're all good at something. But not all of us consider our talents and skills as assets given to the Body of Christ. Say you can sew, make people laugh, fix an engine, bake a great pie, or balance a mean checkbook. Of what use are these things to the church, you might ask. Discernment of gifts is something Saint Paul took very seriously in the early community. In our faith sharing, we might ask each other how "mighty deeds" or knowledge or healing might be translated into modern needs the church has. Don't underestimate the healing value of a great pie!

Help the dream awoken

One of the many things Martin Luther King, Jr. taught Americans was that faith could—and should!—be a driving force for positive social change. He also showed that people of all faiths could put aside differences and do this work together. A Baptist minister, King met with Pope John XXIII and many other faith leaders who later together publicly lamented his death. Keep King's spirit of faith-based social action and interfaith cooperation alive—gather with Catholics and other people of God to discuss, learn, pray, plan, and act on a peaceful journey toward healing all forms of inequality.

Shop with a conscience

Today we note Mary Kenney O'Sullivan, who died on this day in 1943. A Catholic mother of three, she poured her considerable talents into organizing working-class women to demand the right to vote and expect justice in their workplaces. She fought for social justice even as the concept of Catholic social teaching was still being refined and formed into what it is today. O'Sullivan understood and lived out social teaching concepts of solidarity, the dignity of the human person, and the dignity of work. Can your shopping choices, voting patterns, and prayers help uplift workers who are currently mistreated?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 16:1-13; Mark 2:23-28 (312). *"The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath. That is why the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath."*

God loves an underdog

We all tend to cheer for the underdog. We find it inspiring when the person or team least expected to win triumphs. David's victory over Goliath appeals to us for this reason. But there's more to the story. When we have an unsurmountable task before us, it is wise to let God take control. After all, God is all powerful. History is full of saints who did the unexpected because they trusted that God would supplement their weaknesses. As Saint Catherine of Siena advises: "Start being brave about everything . . . Don't look at your weakness, but realize that in Christ crucified you can do

everything." Today pray for God's will to be revealed to you and trust that he will give you the strength you need.

MEMORIAL OF SEBASTIAN, MARTYR

Listen to the peoples' laments

The anguish of physical pain can be a fact of life. In medieval times many artists were fascinated by the martyrdom of Saint Sebastian and created gruesome images of it. For practicing Christianity in the third century, Sebastian was ordered to be executed by arrows. He survived this ordeal, only to later be beaten to death for his faith. Father Robin Ryan, C.P., a Passionist priest, says when he encounters people suffering in any form, he avoids explanations as so much about God and suffering is a mystery. He tries to allow those in pain to lament and share their emotion with God, often using the psalms as a starting point as they "help us to recognize that we belong to a tradition and a community of faith; we are not alone in this experience." Draw solace from the lament tradition the next time you find yourself or others in pain.

MEMORIAL OF AGNES, MARTYR

I stand with Agnes

The stories of martyrs can make us feel a bit uneasy. They edify us, but they also can—and should—horrify us. Why? Because in every story, we encounter human violence, perhaps even a reflection of the violence we ourselves have suffered, committed, or ignored. While we laud fourth-century martyr Agnes of Rome for her sacred commitment to chastity, we must not overlook the fact that she was martyred for resisting a forced, unwanted relationship and inhumane treatment as mere property. Agnes' story is particularly relevant today because women continue to face the very real threat of personal as well as systemic violence. Will you stand with Agnes against gender violence in all its forms?

To embrace a consistent ethic of life is to not only oppose abortion but also to support and defend the dignity and right to life in all conditions and under all circumstances. The term "the Seamless Garment" was coined by the Catholic activist Eileen Egan to characterize this position, later popularized by the late Cardinal Joseph Bernardin. 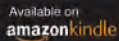
